It opened its doors in 1997 with accolades from *Time* magazine as one of the ten most innovative schools in the nation for the development of career academies, block scheduling, integration of technology into every curriculum, innovative teaching strategies, and the highest graduation requirements of any public high school in the state. In response to changing times and to maintain the robust curriculum RRHS is noted for, RRHS introduced a seven period day during the 2008-2009 school year. Rio Rancho High School is viewed as a cutting edge school and is currently a “B rated” school by the New Mexico Public Education Department.

HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS- CLASS OF 2018

RRHS exceeds the NM Public Education Department's graduation requirements in several areas. We require two additional credits to graduate (26) as well as additional requirements in Science, Fine Arts, and Technology. They include:

4 English - English 9, English 10, English 11, English 12

4 Social Studies - World History, US History, Economics .5, Government .5, New Mexico History .5, Geography .5.

4 Mathematics -including Algebra I & Algebra 2

4 Science – must include credit in 2 of the following: Biology, Chemistry, Chemistry in the Community, or Physics (state requires 3 science credits including 2 lab science)

1 Physical Education

1 World Languages or Career Cluster or Workplace Readiness

.5 Fine Arts (not a state requirement)

.5 Technology (not a state requirement)

6.5 Electives

Students must earn 1 credit in an Advanced Placement, Dual credit or Distance learning course (state requirement).

Students must also satisfy the New Mexico Public Education Department's proficiency standards in Reading, Math, Science, Social Studies and Writing.

GRADE POINT AVERAGE AND CLASS RANK

Each student's class rank is determined by his/her weighted cumulative grade point average. The grade point scale for computing rank in class is as follows.

Regular: course grades:

WEIGHTED GRADES

AP courses are weighted an additional point. Cumulative GPA and Class Ranking are calculated with a weighted GPA.
